

...the knitting challenge has finished for another year. The total number of squares knitted and donated this year is 1682!

- 11 given to Castleman Care Home in Blandford
- 6 given to a supported living house for adults with learning difficulties in Ringwood

A tremendous 'thank you' to everyone who has knitted squares and all those involved in sewing them into blankets. The recipients often reply with grateful thanks and messages of how the blankets have brought not only warmth but comfort to those who have received them.

We had such a great time with top highlights being visiting Le Mont St Michel, watching pupils practise their French at the market, watching pupils try snails and frogs' legs and, of course, the games night and disco where we had so much fun. Un plaisir pour tous!



Here is an account of what we did from Amber Wegener in Year 10:

Day 1: I said goodbye to my family and got onto the bus. We all were very excited for the trip, most of us had planned for this trip for months! On the ferry, Mrs Gilbert started teaching us yoga, so this gave us a great opportunity to relax after our very early start to the day. We practised speaking French by ordering food on the ferry.

Day 2: We woke up bright and early at 7:00 to go to Bayeux market. We had an hour there to explore the market, learn about the culture, speak French, and of course buy things. This was personally one of my favourite things that we did because there were so many unique and interesting stalls. After, we visited the beautiful Bayeux Cathedral. It was absolutely beautiful! Then, we went to Arromanches to see the

landings that took place in Normandy. It was remarkably interesting to learn more about the history of the local area and the experience was very immersive. Then we drove to the Chocolaterie du Drakkar. There we learnt about the history of chocolate, and we practised our French listening skills. Brilliant Club

We are very proud of a group of Year 9 and 10 students who have graduated from The Scholars Programme, run by education charity The Brilliant Club. The hard-working students produced challenging university-style essays exploring 'How do the selected refugee poems challenge negative representations of refugees in the British media.

The Scholar's Programme is a national university access programme. The students were encouraged to think and work independently across seven tutorials with a subject expert PhD researcher from Southampton University. The project helps students to develop key skills for university and later in life, such as critical thinking, as well as finding out a bit more about higher education.

At their graduation ceremony at Southampton University, they got to meet and talk to university students as well as getting a tour of the campus.

On 3rd June 12 students took part in the inaugural senior chess tournament at Moyles court school. Ringwood was victorious in the U14 category with Will Langston (Yr9) winning all his games. Curious Minds - Year 7s

Every Monday after school a group of Yr7 students have been getting the opportunity to be introduced to subjects not on the curriculum - everything from astrophysics, to gothic literature to cryptography. This is all thanks to the staff who have given up their time to organise and run the sessions.

Leave of Absence changes

In February 2024, the Department for Education published Working Together to Improve School Attendance. Within this document, it lays out the changes to issuing penalty notices that come into effect on 19th August 2024. The changes aim to provide a clearer picture of student engagement and absences, to improve student well-being and educational outcomes through a more connected understanding of attendance patterns. As a school we continue to celebrate excellent attendance but will also focus on support: working collaboratively with families and the local authorities to address any underlying issues that may be impacting student attendance. We will maintain clearer communication: keeping you updated on your child's attendance. We will communicate more on this early in September.





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Junior Maths Challenge 2024

At the end of April, some of our Year 8 students took part in a national competition – the Junior Maths Challenge. This was a one-hour paper that the students took online under exam conditions. The questions were designed to challenge them to think logically and solve problems, while using their maths skills.

Nationally, half of all students were awarded a bronze, silver or gold certificate. Ringwood students did exceptionally well with 75% of our students gaining a bronze, silver or gold certificate this year, well above the national average.

Six Ringwood students, Jake, Tobias, Anabel, Augustus, Josh and Darcy, received a gold certificate and Jake did so well that he qualified

HE+

25 of our year 12 students have been able to take part in HE+ project this year. HE+ is run by the University of Cambridge. It offers a range of activities that stretch and challenge students academically and provide them with advice and guidance about applying to higher education. As part of the project students had the opportunity to take part in in-person masterclasses in Winchester, access on-line masterclasses delivered by Cambridge university staff, access super curricular resources online developed by Cambridge academics, complete a small research project, visit Trinity college, and both students and parents could access advice about applying to selective universities.



for the next round - 'The Kangaroo' by achieving 92 marks out of a possible 135. He sat the Kangaroo in June; a similar format but with harder questions and was awarded a Certificate of Qualification.

Well done to all of our Year 8 participants. We hope you found it a fun challenge!



Bournemouth University

A group of year 7 students got to visit
Bournemouth University earlier this year. The
students found out about what university is, they
went on a scavenger hunt round the campus,
had a chance to talk to undergraduates and
ask them any questions they might have about
university life. Students also got to take part in a
forensic science challenge, looking at handwriting,
fingerprints, footprints and blood splatter
evidence. They even got to question the suspects
before the culprit was revealed!



A year of fabulous fieldtrips with the Geography Department

It's been another busy year of field trips for the Geography department, running visits in other parts of the country as well as closer to home.

September saw our first field trip of the academic year, taking the Year 13 A Level

Geographers to Slapton Sands Field Study Centre in Devon. The students carried out a range of investigations in coastal, woodland and urban environments,



practising a vital set

of data collection and analysis skills so that they were well-equipped to begin their independent A Level investigation (NEA) upon returning to school. Each day was packed full of activities, followed by dinner and then classroom time to analyse data. It wasn't all work and no play though: the evenings usually saw a few games of Twister, Uno and Heads-up (even Mrs Cox and Mrs Wooster were allowed to play, although we declined the offer of playing Twister...)

It was the turn of the Year 11 GCSE
Geographers to carry out fieldwork in October.
Each Geography class spent a day in Swanage,
Dorset, carrying out physical and human
geography investigations so that they were
well-prepared for their Paper 3 Geographical
Applications. Their physical geography study
involved work on the beach, investigating
the effectiveness of coastal management
techniques, namely groynes; the human
geography study involved land use surveys

and pedestrian counts in the town to gauge the importance of tourism for the Swanage economy. The students did well at collecting their data, despite doing battle with strong winds and unhelpful tides!

It was the turn of the Y12 A Level Geographers to pursue their coastal fieldwork in November, visiting multiple locations around Christchurch Bay to observe and record coastal processes and evaluate a range of coastal management



strategies that protect the coastline in this area. The students were very active, collecting data at a variety of locations from Avon Beach to Hurst Spit.

December saw the Year 13 A Level students out again, this time to visit their human geography case study place - Stratford and the Olympic Park in London. The students were able to witness the huge amount of change that this area has experienced over the past 20 years, as well as appreciate aspects of the urban environment and community that have survived despite the powerful forces of change that shape our cities.

With the advent of spring came our next trip in the April sunshine – Year 10 GCSE Geography Urban Issues investigation in Southampton, which is their urban case study. This involved all Year 10 Geography classes investigating the changing social and economic characteristics

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of different areas of the city. As ever, the West Quay lunch stop was popular with many and the trip ended with us all 'walking the Walls', seeing the historic heart of Southampton.

Finally, the end of the year saw the Geography team running the Activities Week trips for

As you know, we have been teaching Tier 2 academic vocabulary across tutor time. We are really proud of our tutors and students in the way they have embraced these sessions. The most important thing is that students know and can remember the words and then use them in context and I am delighted to let you know that students performed exceptionally well in the end of year test on the words. Students in year 7-10 took the test to see if they knew the words and could use them in the correct context. The average score across all tutor groups was 9.3 out of 10 – well done! Please do congratulate your child and thank you for anything you have done to support them with their vocabulary learning.

We look forward to continuing with these sessions and learning some new words next year. We will be in touch in the autumn term.

Years 7, 8 and 9 to Hengistbury Head, this time with a focus on beach fun and activities (with just a little bit of Geography thrown in along the way of course!). Ringwood students are a hardy bunch... we played boules, built sand sculptures, did a scavenger hunt and had beach races in all weathers!

On every fieldtrip, our students have been exceptional. We have enjoyed spending the days with them, talking Geography and witnessing their curiosity with the world around them.

They have been wonderful ambassadors for the school and it has been an absolute pleasure to be able to provide these memorable opportunities to study real Geography 'in the field'.

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Drama Department News

Years 7,8,9, and 12 have all put on performances to parents. 'Scary Play', about a group of kids who explore a derelict house, was shown back in May, with excellent performances from the Year 8 Drama Club. Year 12 then followed with a professional quality performance of '100' which was self-directed to give them experience ahead of their practical A level drama exam next year. The Year 8 students who stayed on to watch were really inspired by the creative interpretation and excellent standard of acting. Year 9 Drama Club have been working on a selection of small scenes, which they chose and

developed themselves. Parents were then invited into school to watch a range of pieces from the comedy of 'The 39



Steps' and 'The Importance of Being Earnest' through to the darker themes of 'DNA' and monologues on the First World War and love.



Year 7 then performed 'Twisted Tales' to over 300 people in The Barn in the last week of term. It was exciting to see 65 students being involved in this project which is going to become an annual event for our youngest actors. Behind the scenes, a whole team were also developing skills in costume and prop design, light and sound, ably supported by our Y12 Production students- excellent to see the mentoring and skill sharing from the top end of the school.

Workshop with Splendid Productions

After our trip to see Splendid Productions's adaptation of 'The Government Inspector' last term, we were super excited to welcome the artistic director of Splendid, Kerry Frampton, to Ringwood School in June. Kerry ran two devising focused workshops, one for Year 10 drama students and one for A level Drama and BTEC Performing Arts students, supporting them in developing their skills at working in the style of Brecht. It was a fantastic day and Kerry really inspired our students to develop new ideas for their assessed devising projects next term.





Forest Forge- Elevate Project

The Drama department had a visit from Forest Forge theatre company on Thursday 4th July, and 150 students from Year 7-9 had the opportunity to see this year's Elevate Project.

Elevate is an annual performance project created by Y11 students which tours to local schools. This year's, with a theme of mental health, was called 'Not Another Bloody Walk' and Ringwood students were completely rapt by both the skill of the young actors, and a message which really resonated with them. Each student was given a card to take away with tips on how to make links to your 'things'; your 'things' can be anything that personally helps lift your mood when life is tough.



Activities week: Black Cherry and Special Effects Makeup courses

Rachel, the artistic director of Black Cherry
Theatre, came to lead a two-day improvisation
course. A group of Y7-9 students had lots of
fun developing their skills and increasing their
confidence in working in this style. It was lovely
to see the students making new friends and
relationships as well as being even more brilliant
at drama!

We then welcomed Claudia and Noa to run makeup workshops. This was a hugely popular option and over 70 students got to try out





making scars and wounds- their results were highly realistic, and they enjoyed shocking friends at breaktime! This was followed by a masterclass on how to create the West End make-up for Elsa in 'Frozen'. We finished each day with a Q&A on their careers so far- the students were fascinated by Claudia's final degree pieces, and Noa's experiences working on set for 'Fast and Furious' and 'The House of the Dragon'.

ur group of judges attended the culmination of the Hampshire Book Awards recently.

The Hampshire Book Award is an annual award for the best paperback fiction title published in the previous year for the 11-14 age group, running from the spring into the summer term. Participating schools select up to 12 judges from Year 8 to take part - we sneaked in an extra and had 13 this year!

Our 13 Year 8 judges set to work immediately after the launch - busily reading up until the morning of the event to get them all finished. The judges had regular catch-ups in the library leading up to the voting to swap over any books, eat biscuits and attempt to discuss the books without any spoilers for those that hadn't finished them yet (a surprisingly tricky task)

The students used three criteria to judge the books - Enjoyment, Engagement and Enrichment. Having these in the back of their minds whilst reading really helped the judges pin down their potential scores for each book.

The event itself required the students to join with judges from a selection of schools from across the county to discuss their thoughts as a group. It was great to see them confidently discussing their opinions with students that they had never met before, many with very different opinions to them.



Students have been waiting very patiently for the next delivery of Manga in the library.


